WHAT DO THE SYMBOLS REPRESENT?

Here at Salem First Baptist Church, we are committed to glorifying God, growing to be more like Jesus, and sharing His truth with the world. To guide how we live out this calling, we focus on four key strategies: Gospel Centered, Neighbor Loving, Disciple Making, and Culture Shaping. These priorities shape the way we pursue our mission of leading people into life-changing relationships with God and each other. To help bring these strategies to life, we've created four visual symbols to represent the heart of each one.



GOSPEL CENTERED

We begin with Gospel centered. Because we are led by our King, this priority is symbolized by a crown. The three points of this crown represent the Trinity—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. This is our first priority because everything begins with Him.







NEIGHBOR LOVING

Our next priority is to be neighbor loving. We look to Jesus as the ultimate example. The downward-pointing arrow symbolizes Jesus coming to earth. The cross represents the greatest sacrifice of all time—the very core of our salvation. The upward-pointing arrow signifies Jesus' ascension and how we should keep living like Christ and working for God's kingdom.









DISCIPLE MAKING

Through loving our neighbors, we make disciples. The chair symbolizes the posture of discipleship—intentional, grounded, and relational. The lines surrounding the chair represent conversation, connection, and the passage of time—like the hands of a clock, they remind us that discipleship takes time, effort, and investment in relationships to both disciple and be discipled.



CULTURE SHAPING

Our final strategic priority is to be Culture-Shaping. This begins with small, faithful habits—represented by the small squares—that ripple outward and multiply over time, shown by the progressively larger squares. What starts small can grow far beyond what we imagine or pray for. As we shape culture in ways that honor God, we impact our city—and beyond.

Making the Gospel the focus and the power that shapes all we do as followers of Christ

What does it mean for our church body to be Gospel-centered?



GOSPEL CENTERED

The good news about Jesus is the driving force and compelling motivation at the center of everything we do individually and as a church body. This certainly includes sharing the good news that leads to salvation, but it is not limited to that. A Gospel Centered approach to ministry distinguishes our church from other humanitarian organizations because our message and our example is focused on the Savior of the world, Jesus Christ. He is the center of all we do and through His Holy Spirit,

He inspires us to spread the Gospel to every person in Salem and to the ends of the earth. We have many examples of what it looks like to be Gospel Centered.

The Disciples were Gospel centered. They were with Jesus face to face, learning from Him, working with Him, and listening to Him. Paul was Gospel centered. He was intensely focused on spreading the Gospel, establishing churches, and developing leaders to continue sharing a Gospel centered message in his absence, to both Jews and Gentiles alike.

In this section, you'll read how the gospel shows up in everyday places: at a fast-food job, in a first Bible received, in a decision to be baptized, or in a conversation that shows fruit years later. These stories remind us that God is always at work, and His Word never returns empty. Sometimes transformation happens suddenly. Other times, it's a long road. But in every case, the gospel is powerful, personal, and worth sharing.

Learning about Jesus at Chick-Fil-A

Jolyanna had grown up with some understanding of faith but hadn't been to church in years. As a young adult the Lord opened up an opportunity to work at Chick-fil-A and she immersed herself in their fast-paced culture. It turns out that multiple students from Salem First Baptist were employed at this location. She noticed something about all of them which she would later say was an unexplainable joy (life with Jesus starts now and lasts forever!). The way that they lived their life was attractive and she was drawn to them. When curiosity got the best of her, she asked them questions about life and faith and they were ready with gracious answers. With their help she dedicated herself to the Lord and was later publicly baptized at church!



Turning Points at West Salem

I often say that I'm the luckiest person to get a front row seat to see God at work in the lives of students and staff at West Salem High School. This year has been incredible to see so many students start feeling the love of Jesus through our presence in the school. We meet for one hour on Wednesday mornings to eat breakfast and read the Bible together. This year, we've averaged 16–18 students. They keep inviting friends and the group has grown. So many students say their highlight of the week is meeting together. For them to see and recognize that studying the Bible really is the best thing they can do regularly throughout their life is pretty special!

I want to share two specific stories that show how gathering together has deeply impacted the lives of two students. We have a student who's known for being silly and sometimes hard to manage. But a few months ago, I learned his home life is really difficult. His parents are going through a tough divorce, he feels responsible for his younger siblings, and money is so tight that basic needs are a struggle. However, through Young Life he has found a group of students who love and support him. They give him rides and include him in all the sporting events and extra curricular activities. He texts me weekly to ask if I'm coming to school and meets regularly with his leader to learn how to lean on Jesus for strength.

Another student is currently living with her adult sibling and financially responsible for her housing, food, car etc. At 16 she has the weight of responsibility of an adult. If it wasn't for her YL group and regular check ins on her homework and well being, she most likely wouldn't still be in school. However, just last week, she asked if I'd help her with applications for college next year!

1 Thessalonians 2:8 is one of our core verses at YL and this year has been a foundation of sharing our lives and showing up in their world. Both of the students above are receiving scholarships to attend a week long summer camp. These scholarships are only possible because of the funds provided to us from the Christmas offering from SFB.

Running the Race of Endurance

It seems that witnessing has its seasons. Sometimes you have to go through a winter to get to a spring. So just keep going. "Cast your bread upon the waters, and you will find it after many days." [Ecc. 11:1] Keep sowing. Keep going.

Recently, a friend passed along a note from a woman, sharing that thirteen years agobefore I ever came to Salem First Baptist Church—I knocked on her door to share the Gospel during a very hard season in her life. She had been sober from alcohol for two years and was on her third day of withdrawal from smoking, which she had done since she was 11 years old. She told me it was one of the hardest days she had ever had. That day, she had been repeating to herself, "Jesus Christ has the power to heal me." And then, came the knock on her door. I listened, I prayed for her—and as she wrote in her note, "the urge and withdrawal symptoms left me. It was a crucial moment for my faith."

For some reason, I wasn't able to follow up with her at the time. But recently, as she was praying about where to go to church. God led her to SFB Church—having no idea I was here. I didn't realize that we had met before, but guess who was the first person to greet her when she walked in the door?

In her note, she thanked me for "running the race of endurance." So let me encourage you: Do what God says. Go where God sends you. And finish the race He gives you.

A Student Got Her First Bible

At the beginning of this school year, a group of parents in south Salem started a new Young Life program at Sprague High School. This grew out of a desire to build Christian community within the public school to equip students who know Jesus to be a light and give others the opportunity to meet Him. Following the YL model, Michael and Christine Thorp, along with several other parents, have been hosting a Bible study with a family-style dinner a few times a month, planning monthly outreach events, and spending time in the school during lunch hours.

The focus this year has been on building a base of underclassmen. We're currently seeing 15–20 students at the dinners and Bible studies, and 30–40 at the outreach events. SFB generously gave our program a Christmas gift that has been a huge blessing. It allowed us to purchase Bibles for many students, one girl received her very first Bible! We also created a "work scholarship" for Young Life summer camp, taking 12 people to help clean up the yard of an SFB member.

This summer, we'll be taking 10 kids to camp in Eastern Oregon. Several of them have no church background, but they'll hear a clear presentation of the Gospel.

GLOBAL PARTNERS

Missionary Care is the ministry of sending well.

Some will go. All can send.

"As the Father has sent me, so I send you," Jesus told his disciples (John 20:21). Then he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit." Empowered by the Spirit, the disciples were sent to Jerusalem, Judea, and to the ends of the earth. In the two verses at the end of John, all three persons of the Triune God are sending. When we send, we imitate God.

It's more than sending money—it's sending love through relationships. Caring for global workers means reading their newsletters and responding with prayer, an email, or advocacy for a discovered need. It means attending their potluck presentation or inviting them over while they're on home assignment. The ways to love a goer varies, but all begin with relationship.

Join us in praying for three upcoming short-term teams being sent. Let's lift them up as they go to serve and share the hope of Jesus.

This summer, we have five young adults being sent out for mid-term missions in different areas. Each are spending several months immersed in cross-cultural ministry. They will invest in relationships, share the hope of Jesus, and learn from the communities they're in while exploring the possibility of a longer-term future in missions. Let's continue to pray for their growth, discernment, and the lasting impact of their presence.











WHAT ARE HIGH-FIVE CARDS?

We believe in the power of prayer and the importance of personal connections. That's why we emphasize "High-Five Cards." These small cards are for you to write down the names of five people you care about and want to know Jesus.

Keep these five people in your prayers daily and look for opportunities to invite them to events and share the Gospel with them. By focusing on them, you're committing to finding ways to show them God's love.

Keep your High-Five Card with you, or tuck it into your Bible as a constant reminder to pray for these friends and family members. Look for opportunities to share the hope of Christ. On the back, there are verses to refer to when an opportunity comes up to share the Good News. Be encouraged by Galatians 6:9, "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up."

What does it mean for our church body to be Neighbor Loving?



NEIGHBOR LOVING

Loving our neighbor is not easy, but we are called to do it. To be Neighbor Loving means having the courage to tangibly love people in our city where they are and seeing them the way Jesus sees them. It means stepping outside our comfort zone and building relationships with those who are nothing like us. It is looking at people and their challenges in life and realizing that you're looking in a mirror because, without Jesus in our lives, we are just like our neighbors. Sometimes, it means opening your home and developing long-term relationships that may lead to conversations about Jesus. It means praying for our neighbors, serving our neighbors, and spending time with our neighbors.

Neighbor Loving also means loving and caring about each other's needs well. We cannot shine as a "City on a Hill" unless we also love and serve each other, encouraging each other as we go out into our neighborhoods, building relationships, and spreading the good news of the Gospel. We have been given a command from Jesus to "Love your Neighbor as yourself," and maybe we need to think of it this way: "Love your Neighbor as much as you love your church community." When we do that, we will become a more Neighbor Loving community.

Functioning as a Neighbor Loving community will enhance our ability to be a Gospel Centered church because good deeds create good favor that allows us to share the Good News.

In this collection of stories, we'll catch glimpses of what happens when a conversation or a helping hand opens doors for connection and hope. Whether it's a mom watching her son find community in Upward, Cru meetings creating space for honest conversations, teens hearing the gospel for the first time, or showing up to serve our city. Each story is a reminder of how loving our neighbors is how the kingdom of God comes close.

What began as an idea at a Thrive retreat has grown into a Fellowship of Christian Athletes (FCA) group where the Gospel is being heard, some for the very first time.

"This year God put on my heart to start a Fellowship of Christian Athletes (FCA) at my high school North Salem. I asked Colby and JohnPaul if they would help me start it since we had done a Bible study together in the past.

We quickly got approval from Mr. Purnell and a teacher willing to let us use his room and we had our first "huddle" in mid October. Our group quickly grew, going from barely 15 students, to averaging the largest and most consistent huddle in Salem-Keizer with 30 students each week!! Having our church's support is the greatest thing in the world! We have been able to show our friends how much God loves them, teach them how to pray and read the Bible, and share with several students for the first time the Christmas and Easter stories. We are beyond grateful for the support and prayers our church has given us this year and we look forward to how God will use this group in the future!!"



Helping people mature in their knowledge and relationship with Jesus Christ

What does it mean for our church body to be Disciple Making?



DISCIPLE MAKING

To be a Disciple Making church means we intentionally develop followers of Christ who, in turn, develop more followers of Christ. This happens through purposeful relationships that help our members grow in their relationship with God as they learn to think, speak, and act like Jesus. We foster these kinds of relationships through a myriad of opportunities like one-on-one mentoring, small group Bible Study, corporate worship, sharing life, and serving together. Our goal is to help people find their place in the Body of Christ so that they might flourish and move from spiritual infancy to spiritual maturity.

Disciple Making is not a quick process. It takes time to develop attributes like compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, patience, and forgiveness. The process is best facilitated when we move at another's pace while listening to the Holy Spirit for direction and discernment as we develop disciples of Jesus.

Our best example of being a Disciple Maker would be Jesus. Jesus poured hours of time and energy into loving and helping each of the disciples grow in their faith. He taught, challenged, prayed for, and prepared them for the future. Jesus was neither afraid of their questions nor their doubts. He taught them at the pace they needed to be taught and loved them unconditionally in order for them to eventually bear fruit in His name.

Disciple Making is a priority of ours because it was a priority for Jesus. Disciple Making will result from prioritizing the Gospel in our lives and loving our neighbors well.

Discipleship doesn't always start in a sanctuary. It's more than a program or a class—it's a life shaped by Jesus and shared with others. It begins with a simple yes to serving, going, or gathering with others.

In the four stories that follow, you'll meet people who discovered that discipleship isn't always linear, tidy, or planned. It is intentional, but not always formal. It often takes root in everyday moments, in the midst of doubt, in community, in unexpected courage, and in quiet faithfulness.

Each story is a glimpse of how God is at work in our church family, deepening faith, and raising up disciples who make disciples.

Discipleship Breakthrough through Serving

Sometimes faith becomes real the moment we start passing it on.

Hundreds have come through our children and youth ministry programs over the years where they have been discipled in Awana, Fusion, Thrive, Sunday school, and countless other areas. Our hope and prayer in all of this is that kids will move from borrowing their parents' faith to owning a personal walk with Jesus. Each discipleship program at our church is intentional, but the growth doesn't always follow a clear timeline.

About a year and half ago, one high school student began serving in our Bridge ministry. This year, he moved up with them to Fusion. He had always loved serving, but it was often done behind-thescenes and without much personal growth.



What he didn't realize was that as he began to disciple the next generation, he was being discipled. Over this past year, something shifted. His parents, leaders, friends, & co-leaders noticed a difference in the way he has taken ownership of his faith. Instead of showing up late to church and sitting passively in the service, he was taking notes & looking for ways to disciple others, not just during ministry hours, but in everyday life. From nursery through high school, every hour of discipleship helped shape this moment and led to a point where serving and discipling others was the key to unlocking this young man's faith and helping it become his own. Sometimes the breakthrough in our own discipleship journey comes when we help someone else grow.

When Discipleship Gets Personal

How does a group of moms move from polite conversation to life-changing discipleship?

Mom2Mom is a community that meets twice a month during the school year. It brings together moms of children aged birth to first grade, gathering them at the same table of eight for the entire year. These tables become familiar places where relationships take root, guided by mentors and leaders who help facilitate formal disciple-making through guest speakers and meaningful discussions. As conversations deepen, the formal setting leads to a more personal connection, discipleship that extends beyond the church walls.

We've seen moms grow in patience, love, self-sacrifice, gentleness, and compassion. Last year, that transformation became powerfully visible. When one mom faced an unexpected health crisis while her husband was out of town, the other moms instantly sprang into action. They rallied around her, caring for her children, sitting with her in the hospital, bringing meals, and even folding her laundry.



What began around a table turned into Christ-like action in the mess and beauty of real life. It was disciple-making in its truest form. Life-changing relationships begins with simply showing up—because when you stay, grow, and walk together, God transforms ordinary community into something eternal.

You Can be a Disciple-Maker

How do you grow deeper in faith when the usual opportunities aren't available?

Each year, SFB offers Men's and Women's Bible Studies designed to meet people where they are, helping them grow in faith through thoughtful teaching and meaningful connection through disciple-making. These studies have led to deep relationships and real transformation. But life's schedules doesn't always align with the Bible study schedules. Instead of stepping back or waiting for a better season, they leaned in—and created space for discipleship right in their own communities. One started a lunchtime Bible study at her office, inviting coworkers to explore Scripture together. The other began a neighborhood study with women she regularly sees on her morning walks.

What started out of a scheduling conflict became something powerful. Not only have these women grown in their own faith, but they've also seen God at work in the lives of those around them. Disciple-making doesn't only happen in church-organized studies, it happens wherever we're willing to say yes.

Reluctant to Renewed

The Dominican Republic mission trip became the turning point for a dad who had doubts

For over a decade, the Dominican Republic mission trip has been a powerful part of disciple-making at SFB. We've watched students, young adults, and parents grow as they stepped out of their comfort zones.



We saw people take that "next step" in their faith when they saw how God could work in and through them to reach people outside of their normal life.

This past year, as our church prepared to take another team, one dad almost didn't go. His wife encouraged him to take their daughter instead of her, but he was hesitant. He was nervous to join the team and even said he wouldn't be comfortable talking about his faith because he still had doubts.

But something shifted during the months of team prep. This man's heart was being discipled, not through a structured discipleship program, but by the way the team welcomed him in, taught him what it means to serve, and gave him a role as a valued member of the team.

Once on the trip, God became real to this dad. He began to see how God was working in his life and how God needed to become the priority in everything he did. Upon returning home, he was no longer reluctant to follow Christ he was enthusiastic to follow Christ. He is now serving in our church, faithfully attending, intentionally leading his family, and continuing to be discipled to become more like Christ.

There's no telling what God will do in our lives when we're willing to take the next step, even when we're feeling unsure.

CULTURE SHAPING

Culture can be defined by the collective attitudes and behaviors of the people in our community. We desire to influence our culture so that our community might exhibit attitudes and behaviors that reflect God's heart.

Jesus is the ultimate culture shaper. He lived counterculturally, not to condemn the culture but to reshape it. He crossed racial, gender, political, and religious lines to communicate God's steadfast, impartial love.

Jesus came to seek and save the lost, and as He interacted with the outcasts and outsiders, He helped His followers see that the Gospel is available to all people in all places at all times. This was a revolutionary concept for the Jewish person, so Jesus was intentional in His ministry to travel to Samaria, to touch lepers, and to allow children to come to Him. In the same way, we will intentionally seek opportunities to shape our culture by pressing into challenging areas that will allow us to declare a Biblical Worldview that aligns with God's heart.

The Culture Shaping church needs to be the constant and stable influence in a culture that constantly shifts and flows with the wind of the time. Being Gospel Centered, Neighbor Loving, and Disciple Making will set us apart and allow us to help shape the culture not only in Salem but in Oregon and around the globe. Let's remember the Lord's Prayer, "...your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven." (Matthew 6:10)

In this set of stories, we see that shaping culture often starts quietly. Through mental and spiritual health courses, people are learning to live with renewed minds. In a prison, a shift is taking place as men begin to reject what once seemed normal to pursue something better. And in the life of a faithful teacher, we see how decades of quiet investment can shape generations to come.

Each of these moments reminds us: when we follow Jesus with intention, we don't just move through culture—we help form it.





In a place defined by walls, something unexpected is happening—hope is forming, and culture change is taking place

Something is changing behind the walls of an Oregon prison. Through the faithful presence of individuals from our church, a door has opened for Corban University to offer a fully accredited degree program at the Oregon State Correctional Institution. As men engage deeply with Biblically-focused studies, the impact is rippling beyond the classroom. A new culture is beginning to take root, one marked by accountability and hope. Adults in custody are forming support groups and challenging one another to live differently. Many have chosen to get rid of pornography that they once accepted as normal. It's a powerful reminder: when the Gospel takes hold, even the most unlikely places can become ground for culture change and deep renewal.

Let's pray for continued transformation, for this movement inside prison walls to spread, shaping lives and culture for the glory of God.
