VISION

On December 29th, 1859, eight Spirit-filled people met to sponsor the germinal cell that produced the harvest which is part of those who today worship at First Baptist Church of Salem. What they lacked in resources, they made up for with vision. The State of Oregon had just been admitted into the Union on February 14th of that year. Now there was a group of people who by God's calling formed a church to serve the needs of the Capital of the State of Oregon.

Vision is the life-blood of the church that follows Christ. The vision that drove Jesus was to seek and to save that which is lost (Luke 19:10). The vision that drove the Apostle Paul was to present everyone fully mature in Christ. He goes on to say, "To this end I strenuously contend with all the energy Christ so powerfully works in me (Colossians 1:28,29). Our vision is really the same: God has sent us to seek those who Christ wants to save and mature. Being a church for the city is to embrace that vision through the process of proclamation of the gospel, loving our neighbors, and making disciples that transform the places they live. 

LATIN LINK

Every few years there is a conference in Latin America called Latin Link that brings together WorldVenture workers in the Americas. This gathering gives workers a chance to get away from their normal cross-cultural ministry responsibilities and meet for a time of fun, networking with other workers, spiritual renewal and rest.

In April 2022, a team from SFB went to help care for the children of the workers so that their parents would be free to participate in the conference activities.



The success of these conferences is gauged by how well the adults are networking and how little they see their children. The kids had a great time and many parents reported that the FBC team was wonderful. The team helped set the stage for great bonding to take place that continued after the conference.



DOMINCAN REPUBLIC

Over Spring Break 32 people travelled to the Dominican Republic for a short term mission experience. Although the time in the DR was short, the lessons learned were profound and life transforming. The team was divided into three groups which allowed them to serve in their area of gifting and passion. Each day the gospel was shared with the children in the community through a basketball sports ministry, a VBS style ministry, and an English education class. Even though the language barrier created a communication challenge, the team was able to express themselves through an abundance of hugs, fist bumps, piggy back rides and plenty of laughter. They shared testimonies through a translator and saw many children make decisions to follow Christ.

Together, the team also built a chapel for a church community that had been meeting in a building that was insufficient to meet their needs. Upon completion of the building project, handing the keys to the Pastor was nothing short of a sacred moment. There were 32 folks that built a chapel, shared the gospel and encouraged the local Dominican missionaries, but they served on behalf of a generous congregation that commissioned them to do the Lords work!





Decisions made to follow Christ



GOSPEL CENTERED | Peter 3:15-16; Rom 3:21-26; | Cor.15:3-5

To be Gospel Centered means that the good news about Jesus is the driving force and compelling motivation at the center of everything we do individually and as a church body. This certainly includes sharing the good news that leads to salvation, but it is not limited to that only. A Gospel Centered approach to ministry distinguishes our church from other humanitarian organizations because our message and our example is focused on the Savior of the world, Jesus Christ. He is the center of all we do and through His Holy Spirit, He inspires us to spread the gospel to every square inch of Salem and to the ends of the earth.

NEIGHBOR LOVING Matt. 5:14-16; Matt. 18:21-35; Luke 6:32-36

Loving our neighbor is not easy, but it is something we are called to do. To be Neighbor Loving means having the courage to tangibly love people in our city where they are at and seeing them the way Jesus sees them. It means stepping outside of our comfort zone and building relationships with those that are nothing like us. It is looking at people and their challenges in life and realizing that you're looking in a mirror, because without Jesus in our lives, we are just like our neighbor. Sometimes it means opening your home and developing long term relationships that may lead to conversations about Jesus. It means praying for our neighbors, serving our neighbors, spending time with our neighbors.

DISCIPLE MAKING Matt. 28:19-20; John 17:23; John 14:12; Romans 8

To be a Disciple Making church means we intentionally develop followers of Christ that, in turn, develop more followers of Christ. This happens though purposeful relationships that help our members grow in their relationship with God as they learn to think, speak, and act like Jesus. We foster these kinds of relationships through a myriad of opportunities like one-on-one mentoring, small group Bible Study, corporate worship, sharing life together and serving together. Our goal is to help people find their place in the Body of Christ so that they might flourish and move from spiritual infancy to spiritual maturity.

CULTURE SHAPING | John 4:18; Matt. 10:16-42; John 13:34-36; | Peter 1:14-16

Culture can be defined by the collective attitudes and behaviors of the people in our community. It is our desire to be influencers of our culture so that our community might exhibit the attitudes and behaviors that reflect the heart of God.

Jesus is the ultimate culture shaper. He lived counter-culturally, not to condemn the culture, but to reshape it. He crossed racial, gender, political and religious lines in order to communicate the steadfast, impartial love of God. Jesus came to seek and save the lost, and as He interacted with the outcasts and outsiders, He helped His followers see that the Gospel is available to all people in all places at all times. This was a revolutionary concept for the Jewish person, so Jesus was intentional in His ministry to travel to Samaria, to touch lepers and to allow children to come to Him. In the same way, we will intentionally seek opportunities to shape our culture by pressing into challenging areas that will allow us to declare a Biblical Worldview that aligns with God's heart.

THE GOOD NEIGHBOR PLAN

The story of the Good Samaritan caused the Jews to be uncomfortable because a Samaritan was the star of the story (Luke 10:25-37). He acted like a good neighbor as he took the time and energy to restore a person who was in great need. The Samaritan did not look at the person who was robbed, beaten, and left for dead as a project, but as person for whom he had compassion.

Jesus used the parable of the Good Samaritan as an example of loving those who might not be like us, and when it is sometimes inconvenient to do so. When we accept this challenge by Jesus to be a "Good Neighbor" we are committing to love those God brings into our lives where we live—even if it is at times inconvenient or requires great sacrifice.

THE STEPS:

- Prayer walk your neighborhood once a week.
- Journal what you observe.
- Write down the names of all the family members of your eight closest neighbors.
- Where do they work, where do they go to school?
- Find out what needs and concerns your neighbors have and pray for them.
- Look for opportunities to help your neighbors with a project.
- Invite your neighbors to join you in serving others, including "Serve Salem."
- Invite all eight neighbors to your open house or cookout.
- Invite each neighbor over for a dessert or a meal at least once a year.
- If the Lord leads you, invite your neighbors to a discovery Bible Study.





DEVELOPING

THE NORTH BLOCK

Salem First Baptist has been on the corner of Marion and Liberty St NE since 1862 and has been committed to serving the needs of Salem from its downtown location ever since. Because of that commitment, the possibility of having property across the street from the church was certainly of interest, but not fully embraced until the vision of using the property for helping people move from feeling disenfranchised to contributing members of the community was developed.





As church leaders and others began to work towards the possibility of implementing the vision, God confirmed that we were pursuing the right course of action. We also shared our vision with community leaders who understood and supported our efforts because of their benefit to the community

Most importantly, the members and friends of First Baptist Church embraced the vision as one. God again confirmed to us when the members committed, in faith, to the vision by pledging enough money for the down payment on the property and necessary operating capital, voting overwhelmingly to approve the purchase of the property and its related debt, and paying over 80% of the amount pledged within a ten-week period. These gifts came from everyone throughout the broad demographic and economic spectrum of the congregation. The stories of how God supplied for people who pledged in faith are both memorable and encouraging to all.

Since the purchase of the property in Newport, OR in 1967 for \$55,000, our retreat center, dubbed SeaKrest Lodge, has served our church and community far more than imagined. The lodge and the bunkhouse with the boy's and girl's dorms have been used by various ministries and community groups over the years as well as for other churches and family reunions.

Recent updates to the kitchen (2016) and the great room (2019) have been followed by an ongoing clean-up of the parking lot to make room for future improvements. As we move towards the next phase of remodels to the bedrooms in the lodge, we are excited to see what God has in store for this property on the Oregon Coast.
